Providers of Training in SLCN

LAs/SLT services

Local authorities and speech and language therapy services often provide training for people working in schools, early years settings or the NHS, usually at little or no cost. They may also be able to help if you work for another organisation such as leisure services or an FE college, or even outside the statutory sector altogether.

E-Training

A number of online courses have been developed, mostly for people working in specific services. They vary in their formats and prices. Some are designed for you to work through on your own and may be available for little or no cost. Others offer tutorial support and accreditation and so are likely to be more expensive.

- The Inclusion Development Programme (IDP): This was developed by the Government to equip teachers, TAs and early years staff with the skills they need to successfully include children with SEN. There are two modules on SLCN, one for school staff and one for those working in early years. They can be accessed here: http://www.idponline.org.uk/.
- Advanced Training: This was originally designed to supplement the IDP by equipping some
 teachers with advanced and specialist skills in SEN. The original aim was for every school to
 have at least one teacher with advanced level training in each of the five main areas of SEN,
